In 2015, we made improvements to our building at 23 Grange Rd, relocated the Language Department, introduced an innovative new harm reduction project, and completed our 2015-2020 Strategic Plan. We also faced some significant challenges as a result of funding cuts, which led to reduced staffing and program reductions. As an organization that relies primarily on government funds, the potential for financial losses can't be ignored. In our strategic planning process we recognized the need to diversify our funding sources and are taking steps toward that goal.

Crafting our 2015-2020 Strategic Plan was one of our biggest projects this year We involved our various stakeholders throughout the planning process and their combined efforts resulted in a plan for the future that envisions University Settlement enhancing our role in the community, upgrading our physical space, creating a new revenue model,

improving our IT infrastructure, and focusing on new and creative ways to provide programs and services.

Guided by our strategic goals, in 2015 we introduced the Grange Park Peer Project, an innovative way to make our community safer by promoting harm reduction practices for street-involved individuals. Additionally, we updated our change rooms and pool, moved our Language department to more modern and spacious offices, began the process of expanding our fitness facilities, and, for the first time, conducted a successful holiday fundraising campaign. Finally, we celebrated, as we do each year: Chinese Lunar New Year, Norouz, Black History, Grange Festival, Halloween, and winter holidays were all great opportunities for us to share food, music, traditions, and lots of laughs with our community members.

While there were setbacks this year, there were many more successes. We would like to thank our funders, partners, and donors for helping us continue to make a valuable contribution to this city. And a special thank you to our committed staff, hardworking volunteers, and supporters who worked diligently to bring University Settlement's vision of a thriving community to life.

Board of Directors

Our Board of Directors looks at the big picture. They provide strategic leadership, ensure good governance, and support University Settlement to achieve its mission of providing people with opportunities to enhance their quality of life. Some examples include the Grange Park Peer Project, building upgrades, the biggest Grange Festival to date, and piano by the Grange.

As an extension of the Out of the Cold program, we started the Grange Park Peer Project in order to reduce the harm associated with drug use for street-involved individuals in the Grange Park community. With funding provided by the Toronto Urban Health Fund, we hired four peer outreach workers with lived experience of homelessness and substance use to distribute safe supplies on the streets as well as in the Out of the Cold program. Workers also provide individual counselling and support. Aside from increasing the use of harm reduction supplies in the shelter and in the community, this project also increases the confidence, employability and harm reduction knowledge of peer leaders.

The City of Toronto helped us coordinate some major upgrades to our building and facilities at 23 Grange Road. More than doubling our space by removing an interior wall, in December, we began work on transforming our fitness centre into a modern, well-equipped facility. New equipment was leased and staff hired before the opening of the new centre in January 2016. In addition, lockers, tiling, sinks, and showers were replaced in the men's and women's change rooms and a brand new filtration system was installed for the swimming pool. All of these changes were crucial to improving the programs and services we offer the community.

The 80th Annual Grange Festival saw more visitors than ever before. With help from over 100 volunteers, we welcomed more than 4,000 guests for a day of fun in Grange Park. There were games for tots and older kids, face painting stations, a photo booth with crazy costumes, free hotdogs, popcorn and snow cones. Children and families also enjoyed free entertainment including Korean drumming and dancing, Capoeira, music, a magic show, and much more. Thanks to sponsors like International Financial Data Services, Kiwanis Club of Casa Loma, Adams and Miles LLP, Filion Wakely Thorup Angeletti LLP, Lucky Moose, Wilson Vukelich LLP, and David Scandiffio CFA. The Grange Festival raised much needed funds to support children from low income families to attend our afterschool and camp programs.

In the summer of 2015, we placed a vibrantly painted piano outside of our 23 Grange Road building for the community to enjoy. As long as the weather was good, the piano was out for anyone to play. Advanced players serenaded us with beautiful classical and jazz music, teenagers from the community played and sang the latest pop songs, and beginner pianists came by to practice in the sunshine. We even had a player who was inspired to compose a song titled 'Piano by the Grange'. Though it was the first year we placed a piano outdoors, it didn't take long for our community members to make it an instrumental part of our summer.

Other 2015 highlights include our music students meeting Yo-Yo Ma and having the rare opportunity to perform for a gala event at Roy Thompson Hall. Also, as a way to engage the community in the political process, University Settlement co-presented a Community Forum on the Present State of Democracy and Justice in Canada with Kensington-Bellwoods Community Legal Services.

All of our many events, projects, and transformations are designed for the improvement, enjoyment, and enrichment of our community.

2015 Highlights



Programs





University Settlement Day Care is one of a kind. Located at 23 Grange Road, it occupies part of the larger multi-service facility, which allows access to a gymnasium, indoor pool, and auditorium. The Day Care also houses a newly renovated kitchen, where nutritious meals and snacks are prepared daily, as well as two private playgrounds that overlook Grange Park. With space for 54 children—infant to preschool age—we offer an array of enriching programs and activities, including music, dance, art, kindergym, swimming, science, and nature exploration. Preschoolers and senior toddlers also have access to computers with appropriate educational software. Throughout the year, the children take part in various cultural celebrations and holiday traditions by dressing up and parading through the building. At University Settlement Day Care, children learn and grow in an environment that's safe, stimulating, and fun-filled.

The Language Department helps newcomers and their families adjust to Canadian culture and society through the free Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada (LINC) Program. We have full and part-time LINC classes from Level 1 to 6, open to all permanent residents, conventional refugees, and live-in caregivers. If needed, we also offer bilingual English-Chinese lessons. All LINC instructors have extensive teaching experience in diverse multicultural environments and a commitment to seeing every student succeed. After completing Level 6, many of our students pursue advanced career training and gain employment. In addition to English lessons, LINC students learn about life in Canada—from healthcare to banking—through role play, workshops and field trips. These interactive activities and visits to Toronto's cultural and historic sites gives students a chance to practice their language skills while becoming familiar with their new city.

Employment & Training: The Employment and Training Department provides skill training and employment assistance to those in need. Our courses include Self-Employment Development and Electrical/HVAC Foundations. We also offer a Call Centre & Customer Service Representative Certificate program. Job

seekers have access to our computer lab, internet, and other job search resources and tools. Our goal is not only to help people to find jobs, it is to assist our program participants improve their chances for financial independence through skill development, strategies for overcoming employment barriers, and hands-on experience. In 2015, we assisted over 200 individuals gain the skills they required prior to joining the labour market.

Music & Arts

University Settlement Music and Arts School is the oldest community music school in Toronto, celebrating 94 years of music making since 1921. With approximately 205 private lessons as well as 30 group classes occurring on a weekly basis, the school is always bustling with musical activity. We offer affordable private lessons on a variety of instruments including piano, guitar, voice, violin, saxophone, flute, accordion, and drums as well as group activities like dance, choir and chamber music. Each day we see the positive impact of the arts on our student's lives. Impact is measured through positive feedback from students and parents about how our music instruction has improved their or their child's self-confidence, focus and performance at school. This is one of the reasons why after 94 years, we continue to believe that the arts should be accessible to everyone regardless of age, perceived talent, disability, or ability to pay.

Settlement & Social Services

With a multilingual and culturally diverse staff, the Settlement and Social Services Department is able to provide support services to a variety of newcomers, seniors, and community members. We offer one-on-one help with form filling, filing taxes, interpretation, supportive counselling and translation. We also provide referrals where needed. Our citizenship classes, workshops, information sessions, and day trips are designed to help newcomers get oriented to life in Canada. As a designated Elderly persons Centre, we have a range of programs for seniors, including performing arts groups, Tai Chi classes, and computer workshops that help to keep participants healthy and engaged. In addition to our newcomer and seniors services, we have activities open to the community-at-large that promote community input, engagement, networking, education, and awareness, including special interest groups, health workshops, and cultural celebrations. Our experienced staff members are able to provide services in Cantonese, English, Farsi, Mandarin, Korean and Spanish.

Recreation

The Recreation Department delivers a variety of recreational programs and activities for individuals and families at University Settlement's Grange location. Our facilities—including a state of the art fitness centre, gymnasium, and 25-yard heated indoor pool-offer a fun place to keep fit and healthy, learn new skills, and meet new friends. We provide after school programs and summer camps for children, yoga classes, badminton, basketball, volleyball and year-round swim lessons and recreational swim programs. In 2015, we also hosted our first swim meet. There were over 60 participants including our own Settlement Sharks children's swim team. Other community events include the annual Grange Festival, Halloween Festival, and We Care children's craft-making event. Altogether, these events gather more than 6,000 participants for days of fun for everyone.

Out of the Cold

There are over 5,000 homeless individuals in Toronto. Due to economic factors and reductions in the availability of affordable housing, homelessness will continue to be a priority issue for Canada's urban centers for the foreseeable future. University Settlement continues to respond to this need by providing a year-round, weekend shelter to men, women and couples in the downtown core. We host up to 85 participants each night and offer a warm place to stay, hot meals, snacks and shower facilities. Regular town hall meetings give our clients an opportunity to contribute feedback about the services we provide and let us know how we can improve our program. A housing support worker is also available and helps to find permanent housing solutions for our participants.

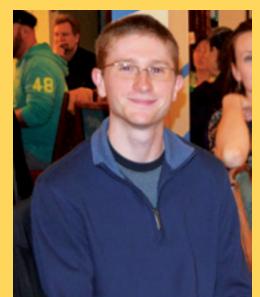

2015 Winner Kevin Fellows

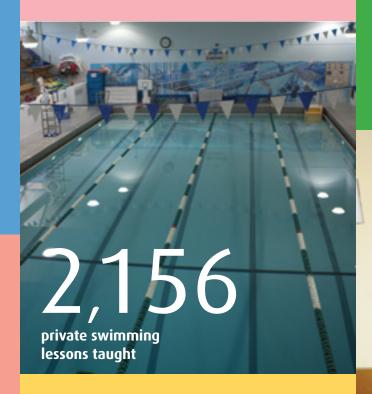

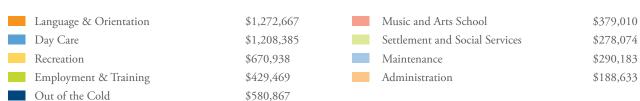

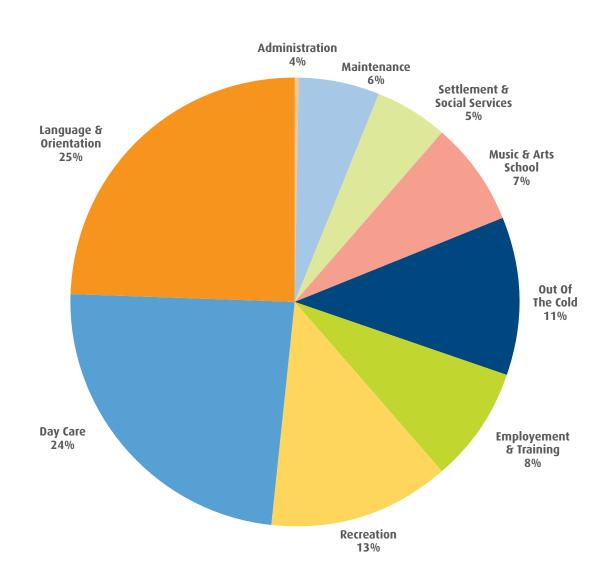
Statement of Revenue and Expenses

Total - \$5,298,226

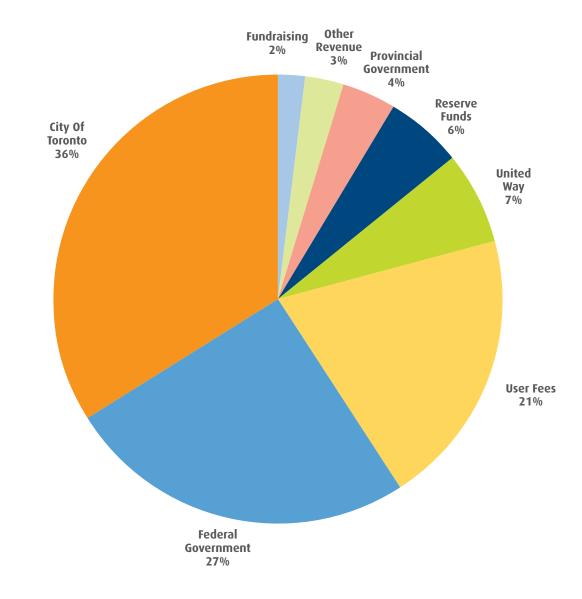




Sources of Funds 2015
